The Great Commandment & Hand Washing

Maundy Thursday gets its name from the Latin word "mandatum," which means mandate or commandment. The commandment is from John's Gospel, where Jesus tells his disciples "I give you a new commandment, that you love one another. Just as I have loved you, you also should love one another." We see Jesus set an example for this love, when he kneels before his disciples to wash their feet. It is an act of humility and service; an act of love that goes beyond expectation or requirement. For centuries, the Church has remembered this act of love and the commandment it exemplifies through a ritual of foot washing on Maundy Thursday. We are reminded just how great is our Savior's love for us, and we are exhorted to go forth from our worship to show such love to those we meet. This evening, we invite you to come forward to have your hands washed. As the water washes over you, be reminded that you have been washed clean by a God who is endlessly forgiving, and remember the promise that in baptism, we are united with Christ in both death and resurrection. And when you have been washed, remember that you are called to be the hands and feet of Christ in this world, sharing the same extravagant, love with everyone you meet. May God give you clean hands and clean hearts to meet this world in humility, service, and grace.


Triduum- The Great Three Days

At the end of the forty-day journey through Lent lies what is known as the Triduum – the Great Three Days. Encompassing Maundy Thursday, Good Friday, and Easter Sunday, the three services actually comprise one complete worship experience; beginning Thursday evening, the service does not conclude until Christ arises on Sunday. We typically depart in silence on Maundy Thursday and both gather and depart in silence on Good Friday as a recognition that we are in the middle of our three day worship. From the Upper Room to the Garden, the Cross to the Empty Tomb, the Triduum takes us through the central story of our faith: the death and resurrection of Jesus. Come, let us enter into these Holy Days together to witness what God has done for us!
